Did You Know?

Jennie Augusta Brownscombe (December 10, 1850 – August 5, 1936) was an American painter, illustrator, designer, etcher, and commercial artist. She studied art in the United States (including at the Cooper Institute School of Design for Women, the National Academy of Design, and the Art Students League of New York) and also studied in Europe (including Paris and Rome). In 1875 she became a founding member of the Art Students League of New York and later served on its faculty. Known for genre scenes and historical paintings — most notably The First Thanksgiving at Plymouth (1914) — her works are held in many public collections. In 1899, the New York World called her "one of America's best artists."

From about 1908 until his death in 1913, she shared a summer studio in the Catskill Mountains with her mentor George Henry Hall. After his death she continued to spend summers in the Catskills, and spent winters in Bayside, Queens and New York City. She died August 5, 1936, at age 85 in Bayside, New York.
